

Author and wildlife rehabilitator Terry Masear's goal is to save every injured hummingbird in Los Angeles. This Sundance hit introduces Masear's diminutive patients through breathtaking slow-motion photography and emotional storytelling. Viewers become deeply invested in the hummingbirds named Cactus, Raisin, Jimmy, and Wasabi, celebrating their tiny victories and lamenting their tragedies.

This documentary traces the life of the renowned bisexual Jewish artist Tamara de Lempicka—from her rise to international stardom in 1920s Paris to her fleeing fascism, and landing in the United States in 1940. De Lempicka was the preeminent Art Deco painter, known for her high-gloss sensual nudes and portraits of high society during the Jazz Age. Following Saturday's screening, Alison de Lima Greene joins the artist's granddaughter Victoria along with her daughter Marisa who share their memories of Tamara's years in Houston.

Liz Carpenter (1920–2010) was a feisty Texas woman who became a trailblazing journalist, White House official, author, humorist, political activist, and feminist leader. Often front and center of where history was unfolding, in the 1960s she served as executive assistant to President Lyndon B. Johnson and press secretary to Lady Bird Johnson. This award-winning documentary is codirected by Liz's daughter, Christy, who will attend the screening.

Christy Carpenter has more than four decades of experience as a senior executive in the for-profit and nonprofit sectors. Prior to producing this documentary, Carpenter served in New York City as the EVP and COO of the Paley Center for Media.

IMPOSSIBLE TOWN

This timely environmental documentary follows Dr. Ayne Amjad, an unlikely heroine who takes up her late father's cause, a decades-long struggle to aid a West Virginia town beset by cancer-causing chemicals. Haunted by her father's mandate to help others, Amjad hatches an audacious plan to relocate the town's 250 residents and bring closure to her father's work.

Codirector and producer Meg Griffiths is a Pulitzer Prize—nominated journalist who began her career at the Houston Chronicle.

RESTORATIONS & REVIVALS



THE WAGES OF FEAR[†] (LE SALAIRE DE LA PEUR)

Directed by Henri-Georges Clouzot (France, 1963, 153 min., in French with English subtitles, 4K digital restoration) Saturday, March 22, 7:00 p.m. **BROWN**

Yves Montand and three other men are hired to transport a nitroglycerine shipment over a treacherous South American mountain route. As they carry their explosive cargo, each bump tests their courage, their friendship, and their nerves. The result is one of the greatest thrillers ever made, a white-knuckle ride from France's legendary master of suspense, Henri-Georges Clouzot (*Diabolique*).

The film was restored by TF1 Studio, in collaboration with the Cinémathèque française, with the support of the CNC, the Archives audiovisuelles de Monaco, Kodak, and CGR Cinémas. The 4K restoration was created from a nitrate image negative and a sound duplicate made by Hiventy.



THE ANNIHILATION OF FISH

Directed by Charles Burnett (USA, 1999, 108 min., 35mm) Saturday, April 12, 7:00 p.m. BROWN Sunday, April 13, 5:00 p.m. BROWN

Poinsettia (Lynn Redgrave) moves into a Los Angeles boarding house where she meets Fish (the late, great James Earl Jones), a Jamaican widower just released from an institution. In the face of personal challenges and differences, they learn new things about themselves through the nuances of romance and happiness. Margot Kidder has a memorable role as the spirited landlady. Celebrated filmmaker Charles Burnett's (*Killer of Sheep*) recently restored drama is a funny, tender study of outsiders and misfits finding love and acceptance through a healthy dose of tolerance.

WHEN FALL IS COMING[†] (QUAND VIENT L'AUTOMNE)

Loving grandmother Michelle (Hélène Vincent) enjoys a peaceful retirement in a small Burgundy village near her longtime friend Marie-Claude (Josiane Balasko). But when daughter Valérie drops off Michelle's grandson Lucas for his autumn vacation, nothing goes as planned. François Ozon (known for *8 Women* and two favorites shown in **Five Funny French Films**, *Mon Crime* and *Potiche*) cast two stars who are close friends in real life, teasing, "I wanted to combine the challenges of aging with a thriller component."

THE BLOND BOY FROM THE CASBAH[†] (LE PETIT BLOND DE LA CASBAH)

Directed by Alexandre Arcady (France, 2023, 126 min., in French with English subtitles, digital) Sunday, March 23, 3:00 p.m. WYATT

Filmmaker Antoine was a child in 1960s war-torn Algiers. When he revisits the place as an adult, Antoine remembers emotional moments of his youth, spent between school, friends, and his Jewish family. Growing up during Algeria's pre-independence period, the young Antoine (Léo Campion) discovers his profound fascination with cinema.



VISHNIAC

Directed by Laura Bialis (USA, 2023, 95 min., digital) Thursday, March 27, 7:00 p.m. WYATT

Roman Vishniac was a groundbreaking photographer of the 20th century best known for his iconic images of Jewish life in Eastern Europe from 1935 to 1938. Few predicted that less than a decade later, these communities would be destroyed, and Vishniac's photographs would be the last visual records of an entire world. *Vishniac* (executive produced by Nancy Spielberg) follows the artist from his early years in tsarist Russia to his emergence as a modernist photographer in Weimar Berlin, his journeys across Eastern Europe before the war, and his family's dramatic escape to America in 1940. Preceded by remarks by Beth B. Schneider, MFAH consulting curator, Judaica.

Indigenous detective Jay Swan arrives in Goldstone, Australia, on a missing-persons inquiry that reveals a corrupt investigation. Jay must bury his personal differences with his young partner so together they can bring justice to Goldstone. Called "a masterpiece of outback noir" by the *Guardian, Goldstone* also stars Jacki Weaver (*Animal Kingdom*).

Lars von Trier became an international sensation with this galvanizing realist fable about sex and spiritual transcendence. In an Oscar-nominated performance, Emily Watson is a simple, pious newlywed in a tiny Scottish village who gives herself up to a shocking form of martyrdom after her husband (Stellan Skarsgård) is paralyzed in an oil rig accident. *Breaking the Waves*, both brazen and tender, profane and pure, is an examination of the expansiveness of faith and of its limits. – *Janus Films*
