We're so proud that the Museum's 35mm-projection capabilities in both the Brown Auditorium Theater and the Lynn Wyatt Theater have been getting media attention. Film and culture writer Craig Lindsey interviewed me in a story he wrote for CultureMap Houston. We were then featured in a segment on ABC13's TV series *Localish*. So perhaps you'd like to mark your calendar for our next 35mm films? We are honoring the late Gene Hackman with a chance to see his memorable early role in *Bonnie and Clyde*, and have set the Houston 35mm premiere of *Anora*, one of the most awarded films of the past year.

The 13th edition of **Five Funny French Films** (or in our shorthand: **FFFF**) is in May. Many of you joined us for its "prequel," **FFFF Classics**, back in March. Alongside new comedies, the 2025 version includes one more hilarious classic we couldn't resist sharing: *Don't Look Now . . . We're Being Shot At!* Let us know what you think—would you like to see two editions of this series in the future?

Our upcoming new releases will bring audiences to far-ranging places, geographically and emotionally. Constance Tsang's *Blue Sun Palace* is an intimate, female-centric story about women who work in a massage parlor in Queens, New York. Intrigue and suspicion abound in the gripping queer noir *Misericordia* by French auteur Alain Guiraudie. And to mix it up, we've programmed the gamer-Shakespeare mash-up *Grand Theft Hamlet*, winner of the Jury Award at SXSW.

I'm very much looking forward to the 11th edition of **Jazz on Film** in June, guest-programmed by Peter Lucas. This year's lineup includes a tribute to the late Quincy Jones, a 35th-anniversary appreciation of Spike Lee's *Mo' Better Blues*, the Oscar-nominated documentary *Soundtrack to a Coup d'Etat*, and much more

RESTORATIONS & REVIVALS



BONNIE AND CLYDE

Directed by Arthur Penn (USA, 1967, 111 min., 35mm) Saturday, May 3, 7:00 p.m. WYATT Sunday, May 4, 5:30 p.m. WYATT

We honor two-time Oscar-winner Gene Hackman (1930–2025), one of the industry's most celebrated actors, by showcasing his breakout role in *Bonnie and Clyde*. In the 1930s, car thief Clyde Barrow (Warren Beatty) teams up with Bonnie Parker (Faye Dunaway), the daughter of one of his victims, and together they become notorious bank robbers and Depression-era folk legends. They form a gang with Clyde's brother and sister-in-law (Hackman and Estelle Parsons) and a gasstation employee (Michael J. Pollard), but are on the run after Clyde commits murder during one robbery.



KILLER OF SHEEP

Directed by Charles Burnett (USA, 1977, 80 min., 4K digital restoration) Sundays, June 15 & 22, 5:00 p.m. **BROWN**

Killer of Sheep examines life in Watts, a neighborhood in Los Angeles, in the mid-1970s through the eyes of Stan (Houston native Henry G. Sanders), a sensitive dreamer who is growing detached from the psychic toll of working at a slaughterhouse. Frustrated by money problems, he finds respite in moments of simple beauty: the warmth of a teacup against his cheek, slow dancing with his wife, holding his daughter. MacArthur Genius Award—winner Charles Burnett's acclaimed debut—his UCLA thesis film, screening in a stunning new restoration—

combines lyrical elements with a starkly Neorealist, documentary-style approach that chronicles the unfolding story with depth and riveting simplicity. The film's outstanding score has never sounded better.

Killer of Sheep has been digitally restored to 4K and remastered by UCLA Film & Television Archive, Milestone Films, and the Criterion Collection. Picture Restoration: Illuminate Hollywood. Photochemical Film Preservation: Film Technology Company. Sound Mix and Restoration: John Polito of Audio Mechanics and Larry Blake. Audio Transfers: DJ Audio, Endpoint Audio Labs. Music Rights: Chris Robertson, Global ImageWorks, and Milestone Films. Restoration supervised by Ross Lipman and Jillian Borders in consultation with Charles Burnett.

Directed by Gérard Oury (France, 1966, 132 min.) Friday, May 9, 7:00 p.m. **BROWN**


Louis de Funès and Bourvil team up again (previously appearing in *The Sucker [Le corniard]*) for this timeless comedic masterpiece about several ordinary Frenchmen experiencing an epic voyage through wartime-occupied France. They aim to get to the free zone and help British pilots avoid German captivity along the way. A monument of French comedy and a massive box-office hit, this movie captivated audiences with its witty humor, memorable characters, and poignant human connections.



ALMOST LEGAL (PRESQUE LÉGAL)*

Directed by Max Mauroux (France, 2024, 82 min.)

Fresh from their studies, Felix and Vincent are a pair of young slackers from the French Atlantic Coast struggling to find their place in the professional world—and in life in general. The pals decide to recruit a team of unlikely "experts" to turn a small local grocery store into an after-hours business for the summer holidays. Rest assured, none of this is completely legal!



OPEN SEASON (CHASSE GARDÉE)*

Directed by Frédéric Forestier and Antonin Forlon (France, 2022, 101 min.)

Parisian hipsters and their two kids have outgrown their city apartment. They jump at the chance to purchase a spacious country home, but there's a hitch: the deed of sale allows the entire village to hunt on their property! Before long, beasts start trampling into the house and bullets are flying. The family makes a plan to protect themselves, but the locals find out and devise countermeasures. Will they ever find peace? Costarring Didier Bourdon and Thierry Lhermitte.



CHICKEN FOR LINDA (LINDA VEUT DU POULET!)*

Directed by Sébastien Laudenbach and Chiara Malta (France, 2023, 73 min.)

In this award-winning animated gem that's perfect for Mother's Day, a mother tries everything to make up with her daughter by preparing a special meal that quickly spirals out of control. *Chicken for Linda!* is a sweet and funny story the whole family will enjoy: a film that speaks of childhood from a child's perspective, detailed in vibrant hand-painted images and told with humor, music, mischief, and poetry.



THE ART OF NOTHING (L'ART D'ÊTRE HEUREUX)*

Directed by Stefan Liberski (Belgium/France, 2024, 110 min.) Sunday, May 11, 5:00 p.m. **BROWN** For mature audiences

Jean Yves (played by veteran Belgian comedian Benoît Poelvoorde), a self-absorbed conceptual artist, moves to a seaside village hoping to reinvent himself. Embraced by the town's quirky creative community—including flirtatious gallerist Cecile (Camille Cottin, *Call My Agent!*) and congenial plein-air painter Claude, Jean finds himself pulled into interpersonal dramas as well as jokes that may be at his own expense.

NEW RELEASES



ANORA

Directed by Sean Baker (USA, 2024, 139 min., 35mm) Friday-Saturday, May 16–17, 7:00 p.m. WYATT Sunday, May 18, 5:00 p.m. WYATT For mature audiences

Anora (Oscar-winner Mikey Madison), a young woman from Brooklyn, gets her chance at a Cinderella story when she meets and impulsively marries the son of an oligarch. Once the news reaches Russia, her fairytale is threatened as her new husband's parents set out for New York to get the marriage annulled. Experience the 35mm premiere to appreciate why *Anora* earned the Palme d'Or at Cannes and continued to triumph through the awards season, culminating in five 2025 Academy Awards, including Best Director for Sean Baker and Best Picture.



HOLY COW (VINGT DIEUX)

Directed by Louise Courvoisier (France, 2024, 90 min., in French with English subtitles, digital)

Friday—Saturday, May 23–24, 7:00 p.m. **BROWN** For mature audiences

Carefree teen Totone spends his time drinking with friends and chasing romance. After the sudden death of his father, he is compelled to care for his precocious younger sister while trying to keep their dairy farm afloat. Various schemes later, he enters a cash competition for the best Comté cheese. Set in the gorgeous rural Jura region of Eastern France, *Holy Cow* is a coming-of-age story and an ode to the love of cheese. Winner of two César Awards including Best First Film and Best Female Revelation (Maïwene Barthelemy).



BLUE SUN PALACE

Directed by Constance Tsang (USA, 2024, 116 min., in Mandarin, English, and Min Nan with English subtitles, digital)

Friday-Saturday, May 30-31, 7:00 p.m. BROWN

In a Flushing, Queens, massage parlor, Amy (Wu Ke-Xi) and Didi (Haipeng Xu) navigate romance, happiness, and the obligations of family thousands of miles from home. Despite the physical and emotional toll their work extracts, the women who live at the parlor have fortified an impenetrable sisterhood. When tragedy strikes, Amy is forced to consider her own destiny for the first time ever. Despite finding solace in the company of Cheung (Lee Kang-sheng, known for his roles in the films of Taiwanese auteur Tsai Ming-liang), Amy must leave the city and prioritize her own spirit in order to survive.



MISERICORDIA (MISÉRICORDE)

Directed by Alain Guiraudie (France/Spain/Portugal, 2024, 104 min., in French with English subtitles, digital)

Sunday, June 1, 5:00 p.m. WYATT Saturday, June 7, 7:00 p.m. WYATT

For mature audiences

After an absence of ten years Jérémie (Félix Kysyl) returns to his hometown of Saint-Martial for the funeral of his beloved former boss. Staying with the widow (Catherine Frot), Jérémie begins to insinuate himself into his mentor's family, while making a surprising—and ultimately beneficial—friendship with a local priest (Jacques Develay). In Alain Guiraudie's (*Stranger by the Lake*) quietly carnal world, violence and eroticism explode with little anticipation, and criminal behavior can seem like a natural extension of physical desire.

GRAND THEFT HAMLET

Directed by Sam Crane and Pinny Grylls (UK/USA, 2024, 89 min., digital) Friday—Saturday June 27–28, 7:00 p.m. **BROWN**

A documentary about two British out-of-work actors attempting the impossible task of mounting a full

production of *Hamlet* inside the ruthless world of Grand Theft Auto. As the COVID-19 pandemic drags on, Mark, who lives alone, is increasingly socially isolated, while Sam is panicking about how he will support his family. They channel their frustrations by immersing themselves in the ferocious, yet beautifully rendered virtual world of Grand Theft Auto online. In one gaming session they stumble across a theater and have an idea: Why not stage *Hamlet* inside the game? Wasn't theater just as dangerous and rowdy a business in Shakespeare's time, and isn't *Hamlet*, a play about revenge, the perfect choice for this place? *Grand Theft Hamlet* won the 2024 SXSW Grand Jury Award.

IAZZ ON FILM

Jazz On Film returns with three weekends of screenings exploring the various intersections of jazz and cinema! Organized by guest curator Peter Lucas, this year's series is bookended by two 1960s films scored by Quincy Jones, who passed away in November. We also present documentaries on drummer Art Blakey and free-jazz visionary Ornette Coleman, the Oscar-nominated Soundtrack to a Coup d'Etat connecting jazz with geopolitical history, and a 35th-anniversary screening of Spike Lee's Mo' Better Blues.

Jazz on Film founder and curator Peter Lucas has organized exhibitions, film series, and public programs in association with the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston; Contemporary Arts Museum Houston; the Menil Collection; Aurora Picture Show; Seattle International Film Festival; Northwest Film Forum; and the Museum of Pop Culture. Lucas is also a writer and multidisciplinary artist.

THE SLENDER THREAD

Directed by Sydney Pollack (USA, 1965, 98 min., digital) Friday, June 6, 7:00 p.m. BROWN

Sydney Pollack's directorial debut stars Sidney Poitier as a young crisis-center volunteer and Anne Bancroft as a suicidal woman who calls the hotline. This dramatic thriller follows their unlikely conversation, the story of her unmooring, and a race against time to save her. It also features one of the best early film scores of Quincy Jones. The feature will be preceded by two early animations by Jim Henson, a program of the Jim Henson Legacy, courtesy of the Jim Henson Company.



SOUNDTRACK TO A COUP D'ETAT

Directed by Johan Grimonprez (Belgium/France/Netherlands, 2024, 150 min., in English, French, Dutch, and Russian with English subtitles, digital)

Sunday, June 8, 5:00 p.m. BROWN

For mature audiences

Johan Grimonprez's Oscar-nominated essay film examines how jazz and geopolitics collided in a nefarious chapter of Cold War history. This propulsive cinematic collage illuminates the political machinations behind the assassination of Congo's first democratically elected leader, Patrice Lumumba. The film also incorporates jazz music and performance footage (Louis Armstrong, Dizzy Gillespie, Abbey Lincoln, Max Roach, and Nina Simone) and explores its connections to colonial power moves.



ORNETTE: MADE IN AMERICA

Directed by Shirley Clarke (USA, 1985, 85 min., digital) Friday, June 13, 7:00 p.m. BROWN

Shirley Clarke's portrait of Texas jazz visionary Ornette Coleman chronicles the musician's story and captures the premiere of a new work in his hometown of Fort Worth in 1983. The film includes contributions from William S. Burroughs, Don Cherry, Buckminster Fuller, Brion Gysin, Charlie Haden, and Yoko Ono. Before the feature, we present Dick Fontaine's rarely seen short film *David, Moffett and Ornette*, documenting the Ornette Coleman Trio at a Paris studio in 1966.



MO' BETTER BLUES

Directed by Spike Lee (USA, 1990, 130 min., digital) Saturday, June 14, 7:00 p.m. BROWN Post-film discussion with guest curator Peter Lucas and Jason Woods (DJ Flash Gordon Parks) 35th-anniversary screening!

Spike Lee's stylish film stars Denzel Washington as a trumpet player attempting to balance craft,

career, and cool while juggling relationships with two women. *Mo' Better Blues* features music by the Branford Marsalis Quartet with Terence Blanchard, recordings by John Coltrane and Miles Davis, and a score composed by Bill Lee.



ART BLAKEY: THE JAZZ MESSENGER

Directed by Dick Fontaine and Pat Hartley (USA, 1988, 78 min., digital)

Friday, June 20, 7:00 p.m. BROWN

Art Blakey formed the Jazz Messengers in the mid-1950s, and the evolving group became a rite of passage for talented young musicians for the next 35 years. This documentary portrait of Blakey captures the legendary drummer, bandleader, and teacher in the 1980s as he leads workshops and performances in London and New York City. It also features candid conversations with Blakey and multiple generations of collaborators including Terence Blanchard, Dizzy Gillespie, Benny Goldson, Wynton Marsalis, and Wayne Shorter.



THE PAWNBROKER

Directed by Sidney Lumet (USA, 1964, 116 min., digital) Saturday, June 21, 7:00 p.m. **BROWN**

Director Sidney Lumet's groundbreaking 1964 drama stars Rod Steiger as a German-Jewish immigrant who lives a bitter, lonely existence running a pawn shop in Harlem. As the anniversary of his family's capture by the Nazis approaches, he is increasingly haunted by memories of the concentration camps. The film's music alternates between frantic jazz and lush string orchestration. Quincy Jones's first Hollywood film score features musicians Dave Grusin, Freddie Hubbard, Elvin Jones, and Oliver Nelson.
