Explore Calligraphy Investigate the Work of Art

This circular Ottoman tile bearing a calligraphic inscription highlights the continuation of the Mamluk ceramic tradition after the region fell to Ottoman rule in the early 16th century. Tiles were often used to commemorate the construction of buildings and city landmarks. The inscription is the *shahada*, which states: “*La ilaha illallah wa Muhammad rasul Allah*” (There is no god but God and Muhammad is His messenger). This affirmation of faith declares belief in the oneness of God and acceptance of Muhammad as his prophet

2. What do you notice about the size of the letters in relation to the size of the tile? Why would the artist choose this size?
3. In what kind of building do you think this tile was found? Can you think of any artworks in your school, place of worship, or other public buildings that incorporate words in them?
